Keep Georgia Strong

Georgia is ranked as the 33rd-largest economy in the world*, but it's current and future competitiveness is at stake. Without a workforce that can fulfill the needs of the economy, the state may risk the loss of new employers and new business creation, and existing jobs to more educated states and countries.

To avert this future, Georgia developed the Complete College Georgia initiative. In line with commitments for the Complete College America agenda, by 2020, 60 percent of young adults 25 to 34 years of age should have a college education. Moving from today's 42 percent to a goal of 60 percent requires approximately 250,000 additional graduates.

The health of the U.S. and Georgia economies depends upon citizens obtaining meaningful degrees an certificates and obtaining them at a higher rate than we do today.
